# **Georgia Guitar Quartet**

St. John's Lutheran Church

Quad City Arts' 2008-9 Visiting Artist series wraps up with a May 2 concert by the Georgia Guitar Quartet, and because the ensemble is composed of classically trained chamber musicians, you probably already know what to expect from the group's performance: some Bach, a little Brahms, a bit of Radiohead ... .

Hailing from Athens, Georgia, the gifted musicians of the Georgia Guitar Quartet (Kyle Dawkins, Brian Smith, Phil Snyder, and Jason Solomon) first joined forces in 1996, and over the past 13 years, have all but redefined the possibilities in - and expectations of - chamber music. Their renditions of classical works have led to prestigious bookings at Los Angeles' Cerritos Center for the Performing Arts and Park City, Utah's Deer Valley Music Festival, but the group's adventurous musical output has also found them tackling jazz, bluegrass, Celtic, rock, and experimental sounds to great acclaim; *Soundboard* magazine raved, "The Georgia Guitar Quartet is a quite extraordinary group," and their home state's

enthused, "These four young musicians exhibit nearly flawless technique and interpretational finesse."

With four CDs to their credit, these accomplished guitarists will display their high-energy virtuosity at St. John's Lutheran Church in Rock Island, giving audiences a sampling of such diverse musical inspirations as John Cage, Béla Bartók, and even Led Zeppelin. But I beg you, if the group is taking requests on Saturday night, restrain yourselves from screaming "Stairway to Heaven

!!!" It's a church, after all; that would be totally inappropriate.

## **Tantric**

In 2001, the post-grunge rockers of Tantric enjoyed a platinum-seller with their eponymous debut - the CD's success based, in part, on the strength of the number-one single "Breakdown." Yet in 2007, Tantric experienced a breakdown of its own after everyone but lead singer Hugo Ferreira chose to leave the group, inspiring the band's vocalist to do what anyone in his position would do: Ferreira re-formed the rock outfit with a new guitarist, a new bassist, a new drummer, and a new ... violinist?

Yet if the group's rejuvenated popularity and rave reviews are any indications, this unusual move has paid off in spades, as fans will likely discover when Tantric plays the Rock Island Brewing Company on Tuesday, May 5. With electronic violinist Marcus Ratzenboeck lending a unique spin to the impassioned rock stylings of Ferreira, guitarist Joe Pessia, bassist Erik Leonhardt, and drummer Richie Monica, Tantric's new sound has been embraced by sold-out crowds during the group's current tour, and its 2008 album *The End Begins* led <u>TuneLab.com</u> to extol the musicians' "effervescent tunes" and "razor-sharp precision."

Meanwhile, <u>HardRockHideout.com</u> raved that after listening to Tantric, "you will find yourself tapping your feet and playing air drums on the steering wheel." RIBCO's management, though, would like to suggest that patrons only do that while sitting in their cars. The concert may be taking place on Cinco de Mayo, but let's not get *too* crazy.



## The Children's Hour

Since January, area theatre audiences have already had the chance to see Augustana College's *The Learned Ladies*, St. Ambrose University's *Lettice & Lovage*, Circa '21's *Church Basement Ladies*

Is anyone else noticing a heartening *theme* amongst this year's stage productions?

Happily, 2009's proliferation of female-driven works continues with the Playcrafters Barn Theatre's new production of *The Children's Hour*, the 1934 Broadway smash that runs May 8 through 17. Set in an all-girls boarding school, Lillian Hellman's provocative drama finds careers and lives in jeopardy when a vindictive student accuses the headmistresses of having an affair; with events leading to paranoia, blackmail, and emotional torment,

- which originally ran in New York for more than two years - is a disturbing and still-relevant exploration of the corruptive power of lies.

Playcrafters' presentation should also offer an outstanding showcase for female talent, both on and off the stage. Area favorite Patti Flaherty directs, with her production staff including such familiar area presences as Peggy Hanske, Donna Weeks, Jennifer Kingry, and Lisa Kahn, and included in the cast are gifted local actresses Jamie Em Johnson, Barb Engstrom, Susan Perrin-Sallak, and Anna Tunnicliff.

Plus, Genesius Guild fans should take note: *The Children's Hour*'s chief rivals are being played by Andrea Braddy and Rae Mary, which means that in addition to Hellman's chilling plot, you'll also be treated to a *de facto* b attle between Electra and Antigone. Now that's drama!


